


Bruce will be joining us from Solwind Energo Inc., Goderich and is a member of the Bluewater Amateur Radio Club.

Update on Canwarn – June 2005 by Tom, VE3OEP



Many thanks to those of you who attended the training session in April given by Environment Canada.

For those of you who saw the presentation for the first time you are welcome to now join a Canwarn net as a weather spotter.

When a severe thunderstorm warning is given a net will be activated on the VE3OME repeater at 145.450. The Canwarn controller also has the ability to change the tones on several of the other local repeaters. This informs users of the other repeaters that a net is in progress on OME. Should OME be unavailable the net can be found on VE3LON at 147.060.

Follow the directions of the controller and sign onto the net. The controller will record your call and location. The net has three condition codes (Green, Yellow, and Red) based on weather conditions. The controller will advise what information is to be reported and whether or not the repeater can be used for normal traffic.

Your help in keeping transmissions short whenever a net is in progress is very important.

Information received from you is reviewed by the controller and in certain cases forwarded onto the Severe Weather Desk in Toronto. From there reports of severe weather can be in the hands of the public in minutes.

During a net the controller will also be passing information back to the spotters on what is happening on the radar screen and what information they are receiving from Environment Canada.

We are also looking for two or three more individuals who would be willing to act as controllers for Canwarn nets. If you have an interest in Canwarn and comfort with using computers and 2M radios, please get in touch with me.

RECENT FLEA-MARETS by Mark Bramwell, VE3PZR

Dayton: Well, it has been almost 10 years since my last visit to the Dayton but I took the plunge and did the trip.

I would like to say that it was actually the same as 10 years ago but I did notice some changes. Dayton is still a huge flea market! However, there were many large empty spaces that were turned into rest-spots. I did not get the feeling of elbow-to-elbow crowds from 10 years ago; if you entered the arena during the morning, you had easy access to any vendor stall albeit the room quickly filled as the day progressed.

Rochester: This is a 3 day flea market located in Rochester NY that costs \$9USD per head to attend (ouch!). A bunch of us did the trip on Friday (opening day) and here is my recommendation. Don't bother going on a Friday. When we arrived at 9am, the parking lot (and vendor booths) was so sparse we felt we arrived on the wrong day. By afternoon many of the vendors started to arrive and get setup. After discussing the situation with many people, we were told that Saturday is a busy day with many vendors gone by Sunday AM. I believe Rochester is quickly changing from a 3 day flea-market into a single day (about $\frac{1}{4}$ the size of the Dayton hamfest). I noticed the lack of security guards asking to show your ticket (financial cuts?) Next year we will consider a Saturday trip instead of our normal Friday pilgrimage.

Fergus/Kitchener: This Saturday (June 11th) is the Kitchener Radio Club flea-market which is held at the Fergus Arena. Always a good day-trip with a nice market downtown for additional activities.

Personal Note: The attendance of the flea-markets is definitely on the down turn. Perhaps the age of ham-radio oriented swap-meets is coming to an end. If you disagree, supports the various clubs by attending (and bring 2 friends!).



How to support YOUR flea market:



The most obvious way to support your hamfest is to [attend](#). We charge a small admission for people to enter the flea market. Bring a friend or two. The standard ham-radio flea market of today contains several non-hamradio items and has the interest of a broader audience.

[Rent a table](#). Many of you have high-quality, under-used equipment that is begging to be updated. Seize the opportunity to sell your old equipment and of course buy new stuff! Start cleaning out your closets and garages NOW and have your goods ready for sale on Sept 25th.

Another way to support the flea market is to [volunteer](#). We need some people for various activities such as security and setup/teardown on the day of the hamfest. Please send me an email letting me know you are interested in helping.

The real measure of success of a flea market is what happens 'next' year. Many of the SW-Ontario area hamfests are dying due to lack of vendors which has the side-effect of buyers not willing to show-up in subsequent years. We are lucky because some large vendors such as Radioworld have already committed to be a vendor for our 2005 hamfest. Radioworld (and other larger commercial vendors) no longer appear at many of the 'smaller' hamfests which in essence was the last nail in the coffin of those hamfests.

Bring-and-Buy



Based on the success of last year's bring-and-buy table, we have decided to offer it again this year!

The situation:

Many people like to come to our hamfest and look around and have a good time.

Not many are willing to rent a table because they might only have 1 or 2 items for sale or they simply do not want to sit there all morning dealing with the endless stream of people asking the same questions over and over again.

Solution: This year the club will have a bring-and-buy table.

Here is how it works....

You do not rent a table but you come to the hamfest as a buyer. You also bring your 1 or 2 items and go the LARC table. We will take the item(s) and fill out a for-sale card that describes the item plus your asking price. It will cost you a loonie (\$1) to leave your item on the club table. When the item sells, you will pay us 5% as a commission. If your item does not sell, you pick it up at the end of the hamfest and the only cost to you was the \$1 that you left earlier in the day.

For example: If you asked us to sell your mobile radio, you might put a \$200 price tag on the unit. You left a dollar behind as payment. When we sold your radio, we keep a total of 5% which is normally \$10. Since you already paid a buck, we only keep \$9 giving you back \$191.00.

The rules are simple:

- We are only willing to sell one or two items per person. We are not trying to displace our normal table rentals.
- It costs a dollar per item to have it placed on our table
- We will retain 5% as a sales commission when the item sells.
- Please be reasonable with your pricing; it doesn't do either of us any good if you are asking an extremely high price for boat anchors. Radioworld is a good place to compare prices because they have both a new and used section on their webpage.
